God Unchanging

I. The Declaration to Us (Malachi 3:6)

In His *perfections*, *purposes*, and *promises*, God does not change.

God does not change in His perfections... (Ps. 102:25-27; Ja. 1:17)

God does not change in His purposes... (Ps. 33:11; Isa. 46:9-10)

God does not change in His promises... (Num. 23:19; 1 Sam. 15:29)

What about the Contradictions?

The Lord was "sorry that He had..." (Gen. 6:6; 1 Sam. 15:11)

The Lord "changed His mind" "relented" (Exod. 32:14; Jonah 3:10)

But the way God deals with people *can change*.

II. The Difference for Us

God is an unending source of:

comfort in our affliction (2 Corinthians 2 1:3-5)

perseverance for our unity (Romans 15:5-6)

hope in our faith (Romans 15:13)

Keep the focus on the <u>unchanging One!</u> (Hebrews 13:8)

- 2. Read Psalm 102:25-26; Malachi 3:6; and James 1:7, the central passages that support the truth of the unchangeable nature of God. What is the context for noting the unchangeable nature of God in each passage?

Give some examples of how keeping in mind the unchangeable nature of God would help you in situations like the contexts above.

3. For each passage below write down the attributes, purposes, or promises of God that you see. Then write down what could happen if God could change.

1 Peter 1:3-5

Ephesians 2:4-8

John 14:1-6
