4. Paul addresses another form of sinful conduct at the Corinthian church in 1 Corinthians 11:27-34. What consequences were the people experiencing for their sin? What did Paul encourage the people to do?

Do you regularly do what Paul advocated in this passage? Describe when, how, etc.

How do you typically respond when someone "examines" you? How should you respond?

Do you have any form of "heart examination" to point out sin at the deeper levels that others wouldn't see?
