Library Moving



18 & 8th to Open Soon!

Perhaps you are wondering what's happening with 18 & 8th. That's a fair question. Things move slowly in churches because business and decisions are often handled by a committee. Committees don't meet every day, and as in this case, sometimes one committee waits for an answer from another committee or board that won't be meeting for another week, or month. So, thank you for being patient. Hopefully you haven't given up on the dream of what this facility can become!



The committee that was charged with researching community needs, presenting a plan for use, and suggesting a policy is coming to completion with its task. Thank you, Becky Brown, Scott Larson, Lynne Hardy, Rich Peach, Pastor Troy, Mike and Sarah Olmstead, Amanda Olhrich, and Duane Zimmerman, (and Penny Ferreri as administrative assistant) for the time you put in!

Here's an update. The four primary uses will be as follows: 1) An event/activity facility for organizations and individuals; 2) A facility for conferences; 3) A facility for a Christian counselor; and, 4) A coffee shop. Those who use the facility will have to agree with our values.

Let me give a little more information on each of these. But first, let me restate the vision. We foresee 18 & 8th as, *A place to love and serve our community in ways that help us build relationships that create opportunities to share the gospel of Christ.* Our vision is that the evangelism and discipleship that takes place is all through personal, one-on-one relationships. We want the community to know that they can come to this facility and not be hit with "a religious" message, just meet some amazing people who care about them. Out of those relationships, and when people are ready to find out what's different about us, we will take the opportunity to share the hope that is in us. Peter writes, "but sanctify Christ as Lord in your hearts, always *being* ready to make a defense to everyone who asks you to give an account for the hope that is in you, yet with gentleness and reverence" (*1 Peter 3:15, NASB*).

As an event/activity area, various organizations and individuals will be able to rent the facility for their activity. Service organizations that need a place to hold an event or a meeting can request use of the building. It will be open to individuals that want to host gatherings for family or friends. We hope our people will volunteer to help some of these organizations with their events and thereby be "salt and light." An area that we would especially hope our people would take advantage of is sponsoring a special interest event, like a hobby, to which those who've yet to believe would be invited.

In terms of conferences, we hope to see conferences offered that strengthen families and help people in difficult issues of life. Conferences could be speakers, or a video series hosted by a facilitator. Obviously, it would include marriage and parenting conferences, but could also be anything from finances to recovering from addictions.

A place for a Christian counselor could take some time to develop. Issues of liability, fees, and Christian vs secular counseling have to be addressed carefully. The goal would be that hurting people could find God's directions and help as they work their way through their pain.

The coffee shop concept may face numerous obstacles. Zoning, setup costs, operations, and profitability are just a few of the issues that need to be worked through. While the committee and others are excited about having a place to meet with those who've yet to believe, the final shape of this is difficult to know this early.

18 & 8th is a big vision. It is way outside the box of traditional church ministry. And yet I think it reflects what is becoming a new norm for the church to reach those who've yet to believe. The day of the tent meeting, the crusade, and even bringing people into the church for an evangelistic meeting is fading in effectiveness. I think we can see the wisdom of Jesus when He chose "go" as the first word in the mission He gave us of making disciples (Matthew 28:19).

Please continue to pray that God will help us use this facility for His purposes in this area. And pray that He will help you to know what your part is in His mission!

Why You Should Apologize for Careless Words

I had been out of town for three days. When I returned, I found that my wife had one of the chairs in our bedroom reupholstered. She asked, "How do you like it?" I replied, "I like it, but to be honest, I liked the old color better." She broke into tears. "I spent two weeks trying to find the right colors," she said. "I thought you would like it." I could have tried to defend my comment, but I said, "I'm sorry, honey. I should have looked more closely before responding. I do like it, and I appreciate all of your efforts to get the right color."

After hearing this story, one husband said, "You really did like the former color better. Why should you apologize because she got upset?" This man's comments reflect an attitude many husbands have during disagreements with their wife. So they settle for a fractured marriage, refusing to accept responsibility for careless words or ill-thought actions.

If I hurt my wife, whether intentionally or unintentionally, I should apologize. When my behavior puts an emotional barrier between my wife and me, it's my responsibility to try to remove the barrier. Apologizing does not mean that what I did was morally wrong; it means that I am deeply concerned that I have hurt her. Most wives will respond positively when we admit our mistakes, when we acknowledge our careless comments or our preoccupation with other things.

A gentle approach. So the next time your wife explodes at your behavior, why not say, "Honey, obviously I have hurt you deeply. Tell me why it hurts you so much." Then listen, express understanding and ask her to forgive you. When she seems emotionally distant, consider responding with, "Honey, I'm wondering if I have done something to hurt you. I sense that something is bothering you, and if I'm the problem, I certainly want to deal with it. I love you."

Owning our mistakes is the road to marital intimacy.



What's New At The Library?



LIBRARY NEWS: THE LIBRARY IS BEING MOVED UPSTAIRS!

"A church library is a storehouse of materials that reinforces a church's message or aids people who want to dig deeper. Libraries have also become a place where individuals and families can find entertainment that uplifts spirits and enlightens minds instead of assaulting their values" (Why the Church Library Is Still Relevant, Luanne Radecki Blackburn). In 1 Corinthians 8:9 Paul tells us to be careful how we exercise our freedom in Christ so that we don't become a stumbling block. The church library can be an important way to combat the "50 Shades" kind of current book culture with books that edify rather than tear down our faith.

Several people have mentioned they weren't aware that we have a church library, others cannot access the library, and still others don't have enough time to come downstairs to browse while family members are upstairs. Right now, the library has an "out of sight, out of mind" location. We have known for some time that an upstairs location could rectify those problems, and we now have a plan to do it! This relocation will make the library visible for those who don't know there is a library, give a better ease of access for those who have problems with the stairs, provide more room to expand our book selection, display pastoral/leader recommended reading, and make implementing various reading programs more realistic.

The move will entail enlarging the storage closet on the south end of the Nehemiah Center to be able to hold all of the chair and table carts and the stackable chairs that are now being stored on that end. There will be a dividing wall from that closet to the west wall that would define the library. This will enlarge the library by about 50% from what it is now. The wall will have two large windows in it for visibility. The library will be able to be used for other purposes such as a Sunday school classroom and a meeting room. The existing library will become an office. We are excited to be able to make this improvement to our facility. Construction will begin soon with a June 1st target for completion.

The children's book section is currently the most used part of the church library. This section enables parents the opportunity to help grow their child's faith walk, which is often a daunting task. Books provide opportunities for children to ask questions about what they're reading. This can enable parents the chance to further their child's growth. Simply reading good books alone can help a child grow in their own faith. The fiction section is stocked with books that tell of characters coming to faith, or of their faith journey; which can be encouraging and help the reader to grow in their faith. The nonfiction section is full of books, from studies and biographies, to inspiration and practical Christian living. The DVD section is full of family-friendly and faith-based movies, documentaries, biographical dramas, and Bible studies. The library contains useful reading for all ages! Watch for the move, but you don't have to wait for the relocation to take advantage of these wonderful resources!
