I. Beware of Neglect (1 Kings 1:5-14)

Adonijah...

David...

My <u>undisciplined</u> child may bring <u>grief</u> to many!

In the Bible discipline is...

Instruction, correction, and chastisement

II. Be Intentional (Hebrews 12:4-11)

My motivation for discipline should always be <u>love</u>, and my purpose to raise a <u>righteous</u> adult.

God's example teaches me to help my child see the <u>cause of</u>, and <u>good in</u>, the discipline.

Never forget: Jesus took my chastisement. (Isaiah 53:5)

What message was young Samuel told to give Eli, the prophet & judge, in 1 Samuel 3:10-14?

If you failed as a parent like Eli did, what might the result be?

3. Read about Samuel's sons in 1 Samuel 8:1-5. What did he learn from being under Eli?

Can you think of a parenting failure you had from following the bad example of another parent? Have you corrected it? How?

4. Read 2 Samuel 13. What happened in David's household? How did David respond? See also 2 Samuel 14:24. Was David's parenting right, or wrong? Why?

Read 2 Samuel 14:28-32 then 15:1-14. How did Absalom respond?

What can be learned from the parenting of these fathers? How can you apply this, whether you are a parent or not?
