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Do Life Together!

Our vision is, *Glorify God by making disciples who join Christ to build families that transform communities.* This ministry year we focused first on, "Love Him more than anyone, listen to Him more than anyone, and leave more for Him than for anything." It was to help us focus on the "Joining Christ" part of our vision. Everything in our vision hangs on each of us having a growing vibrant relationship with Christ and being joined to Him in what <u>He</u> is doing. The focus theme for the next several weeks is, "Do Life Together." Joining Christ is not a mere solo venture, it's also living in community



with others who are also pursuing a walk with Him. We must grasp what it means, in our everyday experiences, to join Christ personally and with others, before we will be effective in building families, or in transforming communities.

"Doing Life Together" is actually a very Biblical concept. I read that there are over 40 "one another" commands in the New Testament, and also that there are over 20 different "one another" commands. Some examples include: bear with one another, be devoted to one another, build up one another, forgive one another, love one another, serve one another, submit to one another, encourage one another, stimulate one another to love and good deeds, comfort one another, and of course greet one another with a holy kiss!

The point is, we cannot fulfill these God-given duties to each other with a "hi" in the hall on Sunday morning. It requires spending some time with each other. Our adversary, the "god of this world" (2 Corinthians 4:4), has facilitated the development of a culture that is pretty effective at keeping us apart. It seems that so many of us are so busy running to this and that, that we have little time with each other. We see the importance of being together that the believers had when the church first began, "They were continually devoting themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer." (Acts 2:42, NASB, underline added).

We need to be careful to recognize that while the people of the early church made spending time together a priority, they weren't isolating themselves from outsiders – the church was exploding with new believers! They were coming together for worship and instruction and encouragement to live out their faith in life outside their meetings together. I'm not for God's people spending so much time at church that that they have no time for neighbors and coworkers. We have to have time to spend with those outside the church to build relationships so that we can tell them Who is the most important person in our lives and why!

I know, it sounds like I'm saying two different things – spend more time with your brothers and sisters in Christ, and spend more time with outsiders. Some of us may be out of balance and need to adjust our lives better in one of these ways. The point I want to stress by "Do Life Together" is more than time, though it does take some time. The point is this: we need to be intentional in our thinking and conversation about discipleship. Our joys and failures, the things we are learning, the challenges we're facing – all of it becomes something God uses in the lives of others as we talk about it! And when we involve someone else with us in putting God's Word into practice, we both grow!

Jesus said, "Abide in Me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself unless it abides in the vine, so neither *can* you unless you abide in Me. ⁵ "I am the vine, you are the branches; he who abides in Me and I in him, he bears much fruit, for apart from Me you can do nothing." (John 15:4-5). So, we need to live lives yielded to Christ first, and that is to result in fruit as Christ overflows out of us. The overflow is for building His body, the church. I need to be more intentional about sharing what God is doing in me. How about you? Can I make a suggestion for starters? Spend a little time talking with someone about what "Doing Life Together" means, and have your Bible in hand.




Guatemala Playground update

Thank you to all who volunteered and participated in the Culver's Night fundraiser February 4 in which \$366 was raised and donated to the Guatemala Playground Fund. To date we have raised \$13,656 of the \$15-20,000 goal. Monroe Bible Church is working in cooperation with *Kids around the World* which is a Christian



organization based out of Rockford, Illinois. They "harvest" unwanted commercial grade playgrounds in the US, refurbish, and ship them to 3rd world countries. It's a wonderful way to bring play into children's lives, show them God's love, and provide churches with ministering opportunities.

2019 Guatemala Mission Trip



The Guatemala Mission Team will be in Guatemala July 6-13 where they will be working on the Missions Training/Retreat Center in the mornings and holding a Vacation Bible School in the afternoon. The theme of the VBS is called *Turned Around*. Children will be taught about God's love, their need for a Savior, the person and work of Jesus, and His invitation to become a child of God. The Craft and Games teams will be coming up with

new and fun ideas for this year. We don't know the details of what the team will be doing at the worksite, but it sounds like construction on the building will be starting.

The cost for each team member is \$1,500. This covers the team's food, housing, transportation, Vacation Bible School supplies, translators, and the training center work project. So far \$6,360 has been raised. 


