Have you accepted God's invitation to His kingdom? If so, briefly describe the circumstances. If not, what's holding you back? Are you proclaiming this invitation to others? What are your experiences?

2. In Matthew 22:15-22 Israel's leaders tried to trick Jesus with a question on paying taxes. He brought the application back to where our hearts are. What are some of the things that vie for our hearts?

In what way(s) are you most tempted to give your heart to something other than the Lord? What helps you turn your heart to the Lord?

3. In Matthew 22:23-33, Jesus corrects Israel's leaders who try to trap Him with a Bible difficulty on the reality of a resurrection. How does, or how can, belief in the resurrection affect your response to the variety of circumstances you face in life? Give some examples.

4. How did Jesus answer the test question on the greatest commandment in Matthew 22:34-40? How well are you keeping the greatest commandments? What are your challenges? How are you most encouraged to continue to try?

5. Jesus confounded the religious leaders in Matthew 22:41-46 with a question that showed the Messiah also had to be Lord. What does, or what should, it look like for Jesus to be Lord of your life?
