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Bad Examples

I. Humility Desired (1-12)

Don't follow examples of hypocrisy and self-promotion, but rather, those of humility and servanthood.

II. Hypocrisy Denounced (13-36)

Beware of those who emphasize the outward appearance of spirituality while ignoring the inner purity.

III. History Decried (37-39)

Respond to God's gracious call to repentance and faith before the coming judgment.

Application Questions - *These questions are provided for your further study and application of the subject of today's message. Thoughtfully writing out answers to these questions will help drive home the point. They are designed to be discussed in your home, with other believers, and in a Life Group, for even more benefit.*

1. What are some examples you of self-promotion. How is it received?
2. Jesus exposes the faulty conduct and motives of Israel's religious leaders (Matthew 23:1-7), but says to do what they say. How can this be right?

Can you think of an example of someone's instructions you needed to follow, but not their example? What was the result?
3. Jesus' teaching in Matthew 23:11-12 is pretty clear. How does this, and the immediate context, help define what He means in verses 8-10?

Think of a humble teacher or leader that you've had. Compare the impact they had on your life with the impact of the person in question #2 above.
4. In Matthew 23:13-36 Jesus is condemning the legalistic hypocrisy of the religious leaders. Can you think of a modern-day example of legalistic hypocrisy today?

Do you have experience with legalism (i.e. you were once in it, tempted by it, or felt compelled to observe it)? How did you respond?

What was the effect on your spiritual life? Did you see any hypocrisy?
5. In Matthew 23:37-39 Israel is denounced for rejecting God's calls to repentance. What does Jesus tell them will be the result?

Can you give an example of a time when you were unwilling to submit to the will of God? What happened?
6. How does our understanding of the grace of God in Christ help us when we encounter hypocrisy, legalism, or rebelliousness in ourselves or others?
7. What is the main application of this study, and/or the sermon for you?
