- 1. Have you had difficulty reconciling God's judgment with His love? Has someone you know had difficulty with this? How did they respond?
- 2. Read Genesis 6:13-7:16. In which verses do you see, 1) judgment for sin, 2) provision for deliverance?

What all does Noah have to do to be delivered? In what ways does he need help? Does he get it?

Do you have a struggle with sin that you need deliverance from? What can you learn from this passage to help you find that deliverance?

3. Read Genesis 7:17-8:19. How would you describe God's judgment on humanity? Is there a judgment of God that causes you concern?

What is Noah's part in His deliverance? How can you apply this to a coming judgement you will, or may, face?

4. Read Genesis 8:20-22. What all did God promise?

Verse 20 appears to be Noah's expression of his faith, and his gratitude for his deliverance. How have you been delivered by God?

How have, or can you, express your faith and gratitude to God?

5. How would you explain to a not-yet-believing person the judgment of God?

How do, or can you, balance fear of God's judgment with God's love, and faith and obedience, without falling into a theology of fear, or works?
