2. Read James 1:1-12. Who is writing and to whom? What issue(s) does he bring up in this section?

3. What does James want his readers to see as a joy, and why? (vss. 2-4)

What was Paul's (Romans 5:3-5), and Peter's (1 Peter 1:6-7), perspective on trials?

Think of a trial you faced in which you did, or didn't endure. What affect did your faith have on your response, and what affect did your response have on your faith?

4. James speaks to those who think they lack wisdom in verses 5-8. What would wisdom be for? What does he tell them to do, how to do it, and why?

Often our trials are in the form of conflict with others and involves words spoken and feeling aroused. How would you apply verses 5-8?

5. How does James urge the poor, and the rich, to see themselves in their circumstances? (Verses 9-11)

How would this help them persevere in their trials?

6. In verse 12 James says the person who perseveres through a trial is blessed. What does successfully enduring through a trial show? How is the person blessed?

7. Summarize what this passage says about why and how to endure through a trial.
