## Different Paths, Different Outcomes

I. The Desire of Man (13-15)

Temptations are <u>appeals</u> to my <u>desires</u> that draw me out of <u>God's will</u> and into <u>death</u>.

II. The Desire of God (16-18)

The will of God is to give me *good*, and He won't *change*!

If I keep the outcomes in mind, I'll choose the hard path of <u>faith</u> rather than the easy path of <u>desire</u>.

- 1. What was a difficult temptation that you faced? How did you respond? What helped, or didn't help?

3. What is a temptation? How is it different from a trial?

Compare the temptations of Adam & Eve (Genesis 3) and Jesus (Matthew 4:1-11). In what ways are they similar and in what ways different?

What starting point, progression, and end of a temptation are given in verses 14-15?

Explain what the end means.

What help do you find to resist sin in knowing this progression, and the following verses - Matthew 6:13; 26:41; 1 Corinthians 10:13?

- 4. Read James 1:16-18. What does verse 17 tell us about God? Why is this important to know? What does it have to do with temptations?
- 5. What does verse 18 tell us God did and why? What does this have to do with temptations?
- 6. What kinds of temptations are most challenging for you? How is verse 16 helpful for making application to verses 13-15 and verses 17-18?
