A. Reveal truth to some

"Whoever has ears to hear, let him hear"

B. Conceal truth from others

#1 Hard Soil (v. 4 & 12)

#2 Rocky Soil (v. 6 & 13)

#3 Crowded Soil/Thorns (v. 7 & 14)

#4 Good Soil (v. 8 & 15)
