<u>Application Questions</u> - These questions are provided for your further study and application of the subject of today's message. Thoughtfully writing out answers to these questions will help drive home the point. They are designed to be discussed in your home, with other believers, and in a Life Group for even more benefit.

1. Read Luke 22:1-13. What significant details about the time, the religious leaders, and Judas are revealed?

What would be surprising to the reader concerning what Jesus does in verses 7-13? (See also Luke19:47; 21:37) Why would Jesus do this?

Temptations and obedience can be like the beginning of paths that take us to a destination. What are some of the temptations or obedience paths you see in your life? Where will they take you?

2. In Luke 22:14-20 Jesus gave new meaning to two parts of the Passover meal observance. What is the new meaning? What similarities between the Passover and the new meaning made this a good time to reveal it?

Why is the Lord's Table (communion) important to you?

3. Read Luke 22:21-38. Jesus gives three prophecies – verses 21, 34, & 37. What is each prophecy and who does it concern?

What temptations do you see in this in this passage? How does Jesus' example show the right path for each temptation?

What are one or two of the most challenging temptations you're facing? Do you see help from Jesus' example or teaching in this passage? Explain. (Try harder is an insufficient answer.)
